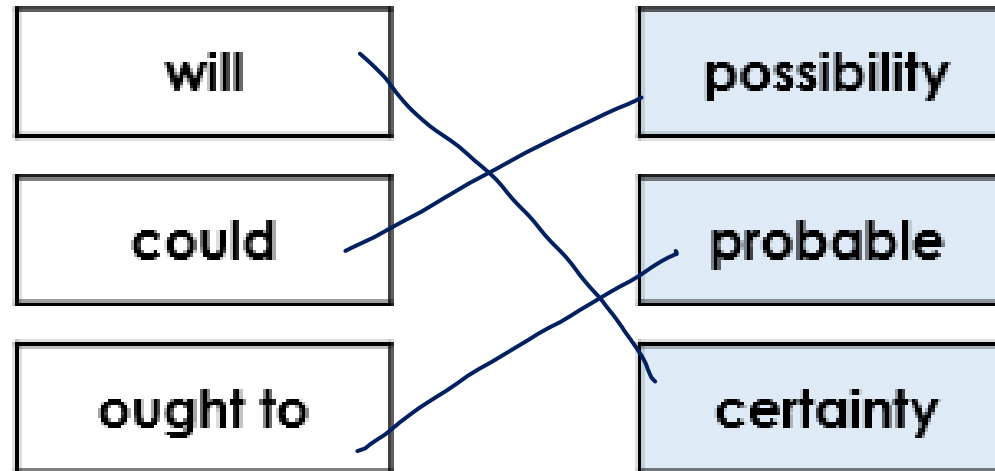

RESILIENCE

Resilience means not giving up even when things are hard and go wrong. Almost all super-successful people have failed before. If they had given up, the world would be a worse place. The thing these people had in common? They believed in themselves. They had a growth mindset.

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
